TEACHER/PERFORMER/CONCERT UPDATE

As always with Zimfest, **nice surprises** keep happening up until the last minute and beyond! Since we sent out the Registration Guide, we have confirmed the participation of our dear friends **Musekiwa Chingodza and Jennifer Kyker.** You have only to hear Musekiwa and Jennifer's new CD, *Tsunga*, to know why we are so excited to have these outrageously talented mbira musicians to teach and perform. And, direct from Harare, we have a group of six young people called **Savannah Jammin'** (featuring **Decent Gang**), who perform and teach both traditional and contemporary marimba, mbira, dance, and drumming to children and teenagers at the Savannah Arts Centre in Mbare. They will also be offering a theatrical presentation on Sunday morning.

Our concert line-up has expanded as well—check out the full listing of performers on the following pages, and count your blessings! Add in the spectacular **pre-fest** workshops, Thursday night concert and opportunities to work individually with Zimbabwean and North American teachers (pp. 5-7), then think of all your good friends who will be attending, and you will have to agree that this is going to be a great Zimfest!

Concert tickets purchased in advance cost \$12/night or \$30 for a three-night concert package. Tickets purchased at the door will cost \$15/night. Children's tickets remain \$6/night.

REGISTRATION UPDATE

• For classes listed in the original Registration Guide, a lottery was held to assign workshops for paid registrations received by May 30. From May 31 through the festival, registrations with payments will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

- For **new** workshops listed in this Festival Update (including both festival and pre-fest), there will be a lottery for registrations and payments **received by July 10**. **From July 11 through the festival, paid registrations will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis.**
- If we receive your registration form prior to July 31, your Registration Confirmation Sheet will be mailed. If we receive your registration form after July 31, your Registration Confirmation Sheet will be held for you to pick up on site.
- No withdrawals from workshops can be accepted, but you may substitute a new workshop listed in this Update if your paid registration is **received by July 10.** You may only substitute within the same session number (ex. a new #7 workshop to replace your original #7 choice). To substitute any workshop assignment with a new workshop offering, simply register for the new workshop on the enclosed registration form and check the "Exchange Workshop" box.
- Workshop locations will be printed in the Festival Guide which will be available for you to pick up at on-site registration. Tickets purchased by mail will be held in your personalized welcome packet for on-site pickup.
- If your final registration costs are less than you paid, a workshop credit will be indicated on your Registration Confirmation Sheet. You can use these credit hours to sign up for other workshops on the new registration form inside this packet. Or, you can wait for the festival and see what's still available.

Experience Levels for Singing

Singing workshops are classified as Beginning, Intermediate, and Advanced with the hope that people will group themselves according to how much experience they have had with Shona singing. As with other aspects of Shona music, singing can have some rhythmic, stylistic and melodic subtleties that are difficult for untrained singers to achieve.

It's helpful if you can easily recognize where the hosho beat fits in mbira songs and are able to pronounce Shona words with some facility before taking a more advanced singing class. It will be easier for the teacher to focus on the skills that need development if people in the class are at approximately the same level.

Changed or Cancelled Workshops

Paul Mataruse's availability has changed, making it necessary to move all of his offerings to Sunday. Those already registered for one of these classes will have first choice to stay in the class in the new time slot. Any openings thereafter will be on a first-come, first-served basis. His cultural presentation, "The Cultural Silence with Regard to the AIDS Epidemic in Zimbabwe" moves from session #1 to #7, replacing "Western Influences in Zimbabwean Music." "Advanced Marimba: Gandanga" moves from session #3 to #8. "Intermediate/Advanced Marimba: Chemutengure" moves from session #5 to #9.

Michael Breez's "Composing and Arranging" in session #8 is being shortened to two hours. This allows us to offer a new workshop by Michael in Session #9; see new listings for a description of "Marimba: Advanced Rhythmic Variations."

MyLinda King's "Make Your Own Hosho" has a cost change. Although this is a four-hour workshop, participants will be charged for only three hours. If you have already paid for four hours, you will receive one hour of workshop credit when you receive your Registration Confirmation Sheet. However, there is a \$12 materials fee which should be paid directly to the instructor at the beginning of the workshop.

Linos Magaya will offer a second "Mbira Drumming" in session #5 instead of "Mbira Variations."

We regret that our friend **Derek Mpinga** will be unable to join us for Zimfest. His **Introductory Shona** class at 3:30 Saturday and his **Beginning Shona** class at 4:00 on Sunday have been cancelled.

New Workshop Offerings

Mbira: Serevende Mahororo

Musekiwa Chingodza Fri. #2, 1:00-3:00 (2 hr) In this workshop, participants will learn a new kushaura mbira part to *Serevende Mahororo*, Musekiwa's version of the song commonly known as *Mahororo*. Musekiwa will teach a high line and variations for the kushaura and, if time permits, a simple kutsinhira line as well. Level: Intermediate/Advanced players (4 or more years) who are already comfortable with one or more parts to *Mahororo*.

Class limit: 10

Materials: Audio taping OK. Please bring a nyamaropa-tuned mbira.

Mbira: Chigwaya

Musekiwa Chingodza Sat. #5, 1:00-3:00 (2 hr) Musekiwa will teach both kushaura and kutsinhira parts for the song *Chigwaya*, a sweet and simple song. This workshop will be of interest to those who already know singing lines to *Chigwaya*. If time permits, we will play the kushaura and kutsinhira together with basic singing lines.

Level: Beginner through Advanced (knowledge of at least two mbira parts)

Class limit: 15

Materials: Audio taping OK. Please bring a nyamaropa-tuned mbira.

Marimba: Advanced Rhythmic Variations.

Michael Breez Sun. #9, 4:00-6:00 (2 hr) Rhythmic variations are a colorful and dynamic way to develop a piece. Students will learn: 1) rhythmic techniques, 2) application of these techniques in interactive play, and 3) appropriate usage. These skills will be taught using *Kapotso*. There will be time for participants to ask questions about applying these techniques to other pieces.

Level: Advanced. Students should be familiar and comfortable with all the parts of *Kapotso*.

Class limit: 12

Materials: Audio taping OK.

Marimba: Kutambarara

Maggie Donahue Sun. #9, 4:00-6:00 (2 hr) Dumi's composition about spreading the culture of Zimbabwe will be the focus of this class. Basic parts will be taught as well as a simple song to accompany the piece. Level: Beginning/Intermediate. Familiarity with sticking patterns is recommended.

Family Marimba: Savannah Jammin' Style

Savannah Jammin'/Decent Gang

Learn a marimba song (TBA) from these hot young players, direct from Harare. A staff of six teachers will make sure you get some personal attention! They teach children at the Savannah Arts Centre, so this will be a good class for kids.

Level: All levels Class limit: 15

Materials: Audio taping OK.



Marimba: Breaking out of the Keys of C and G

(Lecture/Presentation)

Ernest Brown Sat. #6, 3:30-4:30 (1 hr) This class will showcase new possibilities for playing Zimbabwean music on marimbas and the advantages of a chromatic (piano-like) keyboard. It will be of interest to those who are adapting mbira songs into keys other than C or G and those who would like to transpose pieces into other keys. It will also be useful to those who play Zimbabwean music with western instruments and to educators who might be interested in using chromatic marimbas in school. We will listen to tapes and view video tapes of traditional pieces played in keys other than C or G, new arrangements of pieces that use chromaticism, and non-Zimbabwean pieces played on marimba.

Level: Lecture/presentation; all levels.

Class limit: 20

Materials: Audio taping OK.

Singing: Mhande Songs

Musekiwa Chingodza Sat. #6, 3:30-5:00 (1.5 hr) This workshop will cover the Mhande style of song, beginning with an explanation of the role of Mhande songs in Zimbabwe. Musekiwa will teach two different songs with a full explanation of the lyrics. Special attention will be given to creating a full ensemble sound with variations for both kushaura and mabvumira parts. Accompanying handclapping patterns will also be taught. Level: All levels; previous experience with Shona song is suggested.

Class limit: 25
Materials: Audio taping OK.

Singing: Serevende Mahororo Musekiwa Chingodza

Sun. #8, 1:45-3:15 (1.5 hr)

In this workshop, Musekiwa will introduce new singing lines for the song *Serevende Mahororo* and explain the meaning of the lyrics. This workshop is open to intermediate/advanced level singers who are familiar with the basic song *Mahororo* (knowledge of the Serevende version is not required). Participants should have some experience with mbira singing.

Level: Intermediate/Advanced

Class limit: 20

Materials: Audio taping OK.

Singing: Zimba raVashe

Jennifer Kyker Sun. #8, 1:45-3:45 (2 hr) The objective of this workshop is to enable students of Shona singing to learn more effectively from Zimbabwean teachers. Because of the differences in rhythm, harmony, and melody between Zimbabwe and the West, students often need to adjust the way they hear songs in order to learn effectively. Using *Zimba raVashe*, a challenging Mhande song, we will break down its rhythmic and melodic structures and concentrate on learning more effectively.

Level: All levels are welcome; however, instruction will be aimed at intermediate level students who have some experience with Shona singing.

Class limit: 20

Materials: Audio taping OK.

Ngoma/Singing/Hosho: Pfonda

Musekiwa Chingodza Fri. #3, 3:30-5:30 (2 hr) This workshop will give a comprehensive introduction to the Pfonda drumming style, also known as Jiti. Participants will learn about the role of Pfonda drumming in Shona tradition and the basic drumming patterns used. Musekiwa will also teach a song to accompany the drumming and demonstrate how to add hosho into the mix. At the end of the workshop, participants will put all the drum, singing and hosho parts together to get a feel of how Pfonda songs sound when played in Zimbabwe.

Level: Beginning/Intermediate level drummers, some familiarity with African styles.

Class limit: 25

Materials: Audio taping OK. Please bring drum and hosho if possible.

Dance/Ngoma/Singing/Mbira: Shona/Rap/Reggae

Savannah Jammin'/Decent Gang

Sat. #6, 3:30-5:30 (2 hr) Sun. #9, 4:00-6:00 (2 hr)

Expand your horizons and learn about some of the musical transformations that are happening today among Zimbabwe's youth. This music has a traditional foundation and elements of modern style. Participants will each learn one or two aspects of a song (TBA) which will be brought together for an in-class "performance" at the end. Five teachers will be present to make sure you get some personal attention!

Level: All levels Class limit: 30

Then complete side two of the registration form, copy the total cost into the blank on side one, and mail in your payment and registration form. For workshops that may fill, we suggest you return your registration in time for the July 10 lottery as described on p. 1 of this update. Registrations will be gladly accepted until and throughout pre-fest. If we are unable to fulfill your pre-fest registration requests, refunds will be will be available according to the Zimfest policy on p. 2 of the original Registration Guide.

Pre-Festival Concert on Thursday Evening, August 17

You will probably want to arrive no later than Thursday, if you can manage it, so you can join us at Eugene's WOW Hall for a spectacular pre-festival concert. Along with most of our Zimbabwean guest teachers, **Thomas Mapfumo and the Blacks Unlimited** will be performing, thanks to a generous subsidy by Al Green of Anonymousweb Productions.

Tickets for this concert will be sold from Al's website and

will be held at the WOW Hall for will-call. Order tickets in advance via a link from the Zimfest website or at **www.anonymousweb.com**. The WOW Hall capacity is only 400, we advise you to purchase your tickets early to avoid disappointment. You can also purchase Mapfumo's latest CD releases as well as download his songs on this website.

Workshops

In many cases the specific content of pre-fest workshops has been left open so the teacher can be responsive to the interests and skill levels of the participants. Rest assured that we will make an effort to group participants of similar interests and ability levels into each workshop. The cost is \$12 per hour. **Please note:** If minimum enrollment is not met for these workshops, the teachers will be available for private lessons instead.

Although this rate is based on the 10-person minimum we have set for Zimfest workshops, you may include more students at the same rate with the teacher's permission.

Private Mbira Instruction



This will be an intensive, hands-on, two-day workshop that should allow you to come away with a finished or nearly-finished marimba. Farai will discuss marimba theory as it applies to key layouts of each instrument and changes that have taken place in marimba-building in Zimbabwe.

You will have the opportunity to complete a soprano instrument. This includes tuning keys and resonators, putting the frame together and assembling the instrument. If you are interested in building a tenor, baritone or bass, you should contact Craig LaFollette as soon as possible to discuss materials.

You will have the option of bringing prepared materials with you or having Zimfest provide a materials package on arrival (the latter **must** be arranged with Craig **by July 10**). You may work on your project alone or in a group of two or three.

Farai's approach is collaborative—this workshop will



emphasize experimenting, comparing, working together, and collectively coming up with new ideas.

Materials fee: If you choose to use Zimfest-prepared materials, we're working on a low-cost option using meranti keys (similar to Phillipine mahogany, but heavier and denser). Padauk keys will also be available, but at a higher cost. At this point we estimate a cost of \$95 for meranti and \$145 for padauk.

Tools: Participants will need to provide eye and ear protection, dust mask, an electric drill and bits, a rasp for fine tuning, a gouge chisel and mallet. Zimfest will provide electronic tuners. Workshop Teachers/Presenters

Ernest Brown began playing marimba with Dumi Maraire in 1971 when he entered the Ethnomusicology Program at the University of Washington. He is currently a professor in the Music Department at Williams College, Massachusetts. He directs the Zambezi Marimba Band, a student ensemble. At Williams, Zambezi has hosted many Zimbabwean teachers for residencies and performances. Zambezi's first CD has just come out and Ernest is launching a marimba-making business to promote the use of chromatic Zimbabwean style marimbas.

Musekiwa Chingodza was born into a family of great mbira players in Mwangara village, Murewa, Zimbabwe, in 1970. He began playing mbira at the age of five and is self-taught. Through listening to other gwenyambira, or great mbira players, he developed a strong attachment to and love for mbira music. He says, "Our music is both medicine and food, as mbira has the power to heal and to provide for people. Mbira pleases both the living and the dead." In 1991, Musekiwa was a key member of the band Panjea, founded by Chris Berry. He composed the hit song "Ganda" on

Panjea's Zimbabwean album. Currently Musekiwa teaches mbira at Prince Edward School in Harare. He is an excellent singer, dancer and drummer and plays both mbira dzavadzimu and nyunga nyunga. He has recently released his new CD with Jennifer Kyker, entitled "Tsunga."

Maggie Donahue began playing marimba with Shumba in the early '80s. She began teaching marimba in the late '80s and founded Kutsinhira Community Marimba Center in 1990. She is grateful to many teachers but has been influenced primarily by Dumi Maraire, with whom she studied marimba and nyunga nyunga mbira. Her musical studies have broadened over the years to include singing, dance, mbira dzavadzimu and language. She is currently the music director of Kutsinhira and plays with Kudana.

Jennifer Kyker began to play Shona marimba at age ten and mbira at age 14. She lived in Zimbabwe for 14 months in order to study mbira, hosho, and Shona language and song. Jennifer has performed with various artists both in Zimbabwe and in the USA, including Tute Chigamba and Mhembero, Thomas Mapfumo and the Blacks Unlimited, and Chris Berry and Panjea. She is currently a member of both Kudana and the Glamour Boys de Mbare, a Shona band based in New York City. She and Musekiwa Chingodza have recently released their new CD entitled "Tsunga."

Savannah Jammin' is a collaboration of musicians using acoustic traditional instruments of Africa including mbira, marimba, hosho, djembe, and ngoma, along with singing and dancing to produce a sound with a contemporary rap/reggae flavor. Savannah Jammin' is comprised of Jimmy Mhukayesango, Clayton Gunguwo, and Stuart McKay and features the trio, Decent Gang, whose members are Julius Julius, Cornelius Saopa, and Richard McDonald. Jimmy Mhukayesango is director of the Savannah Arts Centre in Harare's high density district of Mbare. Along with other members from various towns, he molded a theatre group, composed primarily of young people in Mbare. Savannah Arts has performed in original and collaborative theater and musical productions in Sweden, Denmark, the United Kingdom, and the Reunion Islands.
